

Strong Foundations 5K and Kids Fun Run





ALUMNI Reflection

God is Faithful

"THOSE WHO HAVE BEEN GIVEN A TRUST MUST PROVE FAITHFUL." 1 CORINTHIANS 4:2

"It exploded," I said to my wife, Kelly, as we peered into our foster son Justin's backpack. We were inspecting the cocktail of dirt, mud, books, and a mangled bean that were the remains of his first-grade take-home project. The students were supposed to take home a bean that was planted in dirt in a Styrofoam cup and take care of it until it sprouted into a bean plant. Lost in translation was the part where cramming it in his backpack with the rest of his books and folders was a bad idea. We inspected the mangled mess and concluded that all hope for this little bean was lost. Justin, however, was determined. He took the mangled mess, scooped it back into the cup, and gave it a little water.

Justin and his brother, Nicky, showed up at our home months earlier in a similar fashion to the mangled bean. Social workers dropped them off late one night with the typical Happy Meal, a garbage bag full of their stuff, and a stack of paperwork detailing why the kids were brought into care. The information in their file was not for the faint of heart. They were bruised, abused, lice-infested, and traumatized. Some of the first appointments we had to make in the upcoming days were with the dentist to fill cavities and pull teeth that were beyond saving. To make matters worse, the goal of foster care is reunification, which means the kids were forced to spend two hours per week with their abuser. They returned from these visits with PTSD-like symptoms. They cried, screamed, had night terrors, and threw emotional fits. It felt like hell was being let loose in my house, which had to be partially true. Only Satan could invent such atrocities being done to kids, and I was a witness to the aftermath.



Foster care is a daunting task. The darkness seems so great that any action we take to help seems pointless. What's the point of my wife rocking a kid to sleep if he's just going to wake up with a nightmare in an hour anyway? What's the point of pouring into these kids if they're just going to get re-damaged soon? It's like watching Justin water his mangled bean project that's probably not going to turn out regardless of his faithful watering.

In a moment of prayer, I asked, "God, how do I solve such large problems?" His answer came through 1 Corinthians 4:2, which reads, "Those who have been given a trust must prove faithful." Not talented, not successful, not intelligent—faithful. Faithfulness is attainable by anyone. In reality, we can't solve most of the world's problems, but we can cling in faithfulness to a God who can. I imagined Justin going to his project and giving his bean a little water day after day. What a picture of faithfulness.

After months of having these boys in our home, we concluded that only God Himself can push back the darkness, and that's exactly what happened! Hell isn't the only thing that was let loose; Heaven can be let loose, too. Kelly and I got to witness the power of the Holy Spirit being let loose one day at a time. Little by little, the nightmares went away. Laughter returned. The boys' biological father returned to their lives with a protective, loving demeanor. The boys' teachers at Dutton Christian provided motherly love at school. God worked in the heart of the judge to place the kids with their father and also stopped requiring visits with the abusive mother. The compounding effect of God's goodness in all these areas was like life-giving water to a mangled bean plant.

One day, we went over to the windowsill with Justin to have a look at his bean plant. "It exploded!" He was elated. This time, it exploded with growth. It was no longer pathetic and mangled. What had been growing under the surface had shot up, healthy and whole.

I don't know your circumstances or your challenges, but I do know that God is faithful. Cling to Him in faithfulness.
