WHY DO YOU FEEL CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IS IMPORTANT?

Christian schools provide a faith-filled foundation for students as we train them to understand the truth in the Bible and share their faith confidently with others. The way that students are treated regarding behavior, the intentional times for worship, and the ways in which teachers integrate their faith into the information they teach become moments where Christian schools can nurture students' Christian walk. In addition, Christian schools provide a safe environment for students to ask questions and see God in all aspects of their learning, taught by teachers and staff who share the same faith. Christian schools exist to work together with home and church, with the goal of nurturing Christian teaching and life. Existing in a community together allows us to build a strong foundation of faith for each child. Christian schools help build that strong foundation of faith for their students by being rooted firmly in God's word and world, and pointing to God's truth as it permeates every academic subject and educational initiative.

When we are rooted in Christ, we stand firm in our foundation, and our practices are shaped and formed by what we believe. A reformed worldview in education provides teaching in which Christ shines through all learning and recognizes that all students are created in God's image and play an important role in His story. Viewing students as image-bearers of God should be the overarching factor that influences each decision and permeates every relationship within the classroom.
