
Why do you feel Christian Education is important? Why are your children attending South

The direct influence of faith into the classroom on many different levels (from K-12), especially with the TfT happening at all levels is a reinforcer of that intentional integration of Christ and his life into my children. A lack of a unified South Suburban Christian Schools association is another, but on a different level then the aforementioned items.

Many of these concerns are public relation nightmares. Promotions and educational committees are no longer just about hiring and printing shirts, but now about looking to those who are in the classroom daily and utilizing the strengths of the staff to spread the Word of God and his good deeds, but to speak in a positive way about SCHS. Parents too need to talk about the good things which happen within the school to keep the Christian Education viable.

Even as products of Christian education ourselves, the choice to send our own children to Christian schools was not a foregone conclusion but was one made with deliberate consideration. We made our choice, and continue our support, in part because Christian schools as an institution in, and a choice for, a local community is a concrete way of having God's Kingdom be explicitly present in that community. While we have clearly witnessed the value of this education on our own children, we have seen this blessing as well to the community we are blessed to be a part of. We strive, therefore, to be a blessing to the community even as we are blessed ourselves.
